Introduction

The Falcon Primary School Annual Report for 2022 provides us with an opportunity to share the year's achievements and progress with the school community. This includes reflecting on the school's performance and explaining the positive impact of school improvement efforts on student outcomes.

After 2 years of preparing for COVID-19, 2022 was the year that COVID really impacted Western Australian schools with open borders, enforced isolation periods and the virus running rampant throughout the community. There is no doubt that COVID impacted on our NAPLAN performance in 2022, with the peak of the virus coinciding with NAPLAN testing in Term 2. Sickness and enforced isolation also impacted on our Semester 1 attendance data.

This year's Annual Report does not include comparative data for the 2022 NAPLAN testing for our Year 3 and 5 students in the areas of Reading, Writing, Spelling, Grammar & Punctuation and Numeracy. Due to NAPLAN testing being cancelled in 2020 there is no comparative or progress data available for the 2022 cohorts. That is, our Year 5 students would have been Year 3 in 2020 when NAPLAN was cancelled. Further due to the impact of COVID in 2022, much of the systemic data which compares schools to "Like Schools" has not been made available.

We are able to present to the community the performance of students at Falcon Primary School in PAT (Progressive Achievement Testing). This data compares the performance of students at Falcon Primary School to the National performance means. Whilst we are delighted to be able to share gains we have made in student performance in some areas in 2022, we have also identified areas for improvement based on this data.

A Positive Behaviour Support (PBS) system was initiated in 2022 to encourage the behaviours we wish to see more of. 2022 suspension data has remained within expected levels. It is anticipated that the PBS system will result in a behaviour matrix being created to teach expected behaviours in every classroom with the aim of reducing negative behaviours.

Attendance data for 2022 saw a significant drop in the rate of regular attendance, however this can be attributed to the impact of COVID. Despite the decrease in our regular attendance rate, we exceeded the performance of our Like Schools and the WA Public Schools average.

Our National School Opinion Survey data demonstrated extremely positive feedback from all groups surveyed: students, parents and staff. Parent participation in the survey was slightly lower than previous years but still demonstrates high level engagement and support from our parent body. We sincerely thank our parents and carers who responded to the school satisfaction survey and continue to invest their time and effort into our school, it is crucial for building and sustaining a healthy school community

2022 was yet another year in which we provided our students with varied and vast opportunities in academic, social/emotional, arts, sporting and cultural domains. Most of these have been captured as "Highlights" and photographs from the year.

The ongoing commitment of our teaching and non-teaching staff and their relationships with students, parents and the wider community of Falcon stand us in good stead to achieve the targets in our priority areas of high quality teaching, a safe and supportive learning environment and community partnerships and relationships.

I sincerely thank Mrs Tiffany Hennessey for her leadership as Acting Principal in 2022 and wish our outgoing Principal Mr Peter Dunning the very best of success in his future endeavours.

In 2022 our Languages program was Japanese.

The Year 3 to Year 6 students participated in a vibrant and contemporary Japanese language and culture program under the specialist instruction of Mrs Hughes.

The program was enriched with the inclusion of a full-time native Japanese Languages Assistant.

Specific highlights during 2022 included:

- Acknowledging Japanese culture by celebrating their festivals with Japanese craft and cooking associated with special days.
- Networking via Zoom conference with Japanese teacher in Osaka City and students exchanging Pen-Pal emails between our two schools.
- Japanese School Based activities such as Origami Club and Hiragana Karate Belt Club.
- Japanese cultural display and interactive activities on Open Night. Parents and students were able to dress in traditional clothes, make Onigiri, use hiragana apps on iPads, enjoy a chopstick challenge and play with Japanese toys.
- Celebrating Harmony Day.
- Incursions Taiko Drumming postponed to 2023 due to Covid.



Science was again a key learning area for our school with Mrs Lake as primary Science specialist teacher. There was a continued focus on the development and delivery of the Science curriculum which is aligned with the West Australian Curriculum.

The major strategies and highlights in Science have involved:

- The continued implementation of a Science specialist program.
- The implementation of the WA Curriculum.

- The development and planning of engaging, relevant, inquiry-based lessons that integrate the three strands of Science Inquiry Skills, Science Understanding and Science as a Human Endeavour.
- The development of a set of minimum standard skills and expectations for each year level.
- The engagement of the wider school community during special events.
- The communication of Science activities, news and information to the whole school community using various formats.



Students at Falcon PS continued to demonstrate excellent musicianship

having been taught explicit music skills by our Music Specialist Mr Chaudhry, who has helped them to develop their foundation skills and knowledge to a higher than average standard. Students are learning to play real instruments in a highly stimulating, specialised Music Room environment.

Highlights include:

- Approximately 200 students participated in Drama and Choir clubs.
- Data indicates high level student engagement, with very few behavioural incidents recorded in Music/Performing Arts lessons and clubs.
- Parent feedback indicated a high level of satisfaction with Music and Drama club.
- Students in Choirs, Drama clubs and instrumental lessons demonstrated more sophisticated musicianship skills due to greater exposure of music.
- The target of increased singing opportunities, ultimately developing performance/confidence/reading skills
- Choir returned to Lower School (Yrs2 & 3) and Upper School (Yrs 4,5,6) groups.

- Approximately 110 children in main Choirs, 15 Clarinet/Flute IMMS, approximately 20 PMI. Many more students are having Performing Arts lessons out of school.
- No WAGSMS in 2022 due to COVID, but returning in 2023.
- Senior & Junior Choirs performed in Christmas Concert hosted by Falcon PS, involving Halls Head College and Waratah Church. Kindergarten, Pre-Primary and Year 1 students performed. The Christmas Concert was a fantastic whole school community event. We invited donations of non-perishable food on entry for local charities.
- Halls Head College will host the Christmas Concert in 2023.
- Senior Choir was the `performance' Choir. Performed at Celebratory, Presentation, Awards and Graduation assemblies.
- Continued focus on early and middle years has developed a new generation of musicians. Numbers in Choir/Drama Years 2 and 3 are growing. Numbers participating in Years 4/5 exceed previous years. Year 6 has participation increased in 2022.

- The skills of the children in Years 4-6 have again improved and this is evident in the Clarinet IMMS (formerly SIM) testing data. Our results are amongst the highest in our region, so IMMS have added more students' places, including Brass and possibly a band in future years. 15 new Y5 students in 2023: 5 Clarinet, 5 Flute, 5 Brass and continuing 5 Y6 Flute & 5 Y6 Clarinet.
- PMI Lessons in Music Room after school on Tuesdays & Fridays. Lessons available for keyboard, guitar, drums, singing, uke, bass and electric guitar.
- Whole School song sung across the school from PP to Year 6. Improves reading skills and increases confidence/ performance skills. Performed in student assemblies.
- House/Faction Dance & Song performance – Student rewrote words to a pop song and added dance moves. House Captains taught the whole school. On Sports Carnival Day, they led the whole school as our warm-up/aerobic exercise song.
- Harmony Day/ANZAC Day/Events Song learnt by all classes and performed at all events
- Y6 PA Monitors supported all live events including concerts and assemblies. Trained and organised by Mr Chaudhry. Increases confidence and problem-solving.



Falcon PS continued with a priority curriculum focus on Literacy in 2022.

Major strategies in Literacy included:

- Teachers continuing to use the West Australian Curriculum to plan, assess and report.
- The on-going development and commitment to the Falcon Primary School scope and sequence curriculum planning documents.
- Teachers collaborating with year level colleagues to plan, create, implement and teach high quality literacy lessons.
- Utilizing assessment data to reflect on and inform teaching practices.
- Continuing to build teacher resources and student resources in reading, writing and phonics.
- The implementation of a wide range of class-based strategies that included:
 - Continuing to develop and implement high quality Literacy Warmups
 - The initiation of Letters and Sounds in Kindergarten, Pre-Primary, Year 1 and Year 2

- Continuing to implement Heggerty in Kindergarten, Pre-Primary, Year 1 and Year 2
- Sound Waves spelling program from Year 3-6
- Talk for Writing in Pre-Primary-Year 2
- Seven Steps to Writing Success and Talk for Writing in Year 3-6
- Little Learner's Love Literacy reading assessment tool in Pre-Primary, Year 1 and Year 2
- The initiation of MiniLit as an intervention program in the early years
- The initiation of MacqLit as an intervention program in the middle and upper years
- Book Week activities including a book week parade and staff play
- Speak up event for Year 5-6
- Various excursions and incursions including the National Simultaneous Story time event.
- A range of tutoring programs utilising community volunteers across the school including Story Dogs.

In 2022 Numeracy was a key school priority area led by our Maths Team Leader Mrs Lake.

Specific strategies in Numeracy in 2022 included:

- The continued use of the Oxford Mathematics scope and sequence curriculum planning document as a planning reference.
- The implementation of Numeracy warm ups using Ed Companion.
- Participation in a whole school Tables Challenge.
- Explicitly teaching problem solving via a concrete, pictorial, abstract approach to deal with unfamiliar or complex problems.
- The purchase of an array of hands-on materials.
- Utilisation of NAPLAN based problems to support student readiness for NAPLAN.



In 2022 Visual Arts was taught in Pre Primary to Year 6 by our specialist teacher Ms Green until the middle of Term 3, then by Mrs Driver until the end of the school year.

Our work in this area included:

- Displays of student work in the school's reception. This included a display for Parent Open Afternoon.
- A lunch-time art class was available for students to further their Art skills or to complete work.
- A whole school art exhibition during Parent Open Afternoon.
- An integrated Art program within HASS / NAIDOC Week celebration.
- Media arts were integrated across the learning areas.
- Art Boxes were provided to each phase for use across the school.
- Famous artists and their particular styles was the focus for the last 1 ½ terms. The artists included Pablo Picasso, Yayoi Kusama, Wassily Kandinski, Frida Kahlo, Andy Warhol and Romero Britto. Students emulated each artist's unique style.
- Art work was featured in our school library.
- Art folders were made in readiness for each student to house their art work in 2023.

Physical Education continued to be a specialist subject in 2022 with Mrs Paula Shanahan teaching this area of the curriculum.

All students in Years K-6 participated in the appropriate level of physical activity each week, in line with DOE policy. Our children also participated in a wide range of activities that included sporting and leisure activities.

Particular highlights for 2022 included:

- Participating in the Falcon PS and Interschool Athletics Carnivals.
- Successful interschool team performances at Y 5/6 bowls, cricket and cross-country running.
- ullet Winter sport for Year 5 & 6.
- Lightening Carnival.
- The facilitation of the Smelly Shoe Club running program before school.
- A high level of participation of children in In-Term Swimming lessons at MARC (P-2) and Avalon Beach (3-6).
- Protective Behaviours was taught across all year levels.
- School-wide participation in R U OK Day.

In 2022 Falcon Primary School continued to develop ICT resources and infrastructure to ensure that our students have access to contemporary tools to assist learning.

This Learning Area area was led by Mrs Wiese who ensured we continued to be proactive integrating ICT into the curriculum.

Specific strategies and highlights in this area of school included:

- The increased provision of classroom devices across the school.
- The increased use of web-based applications in classrooms.
- The ongoing development of our Digital Technologies program providing a specialist teacher for P-Yr2 students.
- The ongoing participation in the ACER Online PAT Testing.

Regular Attendance

The target for regular attendance cannot be measured until 2024, however data indicates that Falcon PS is achieving a higher rate of attendance than both Like Schools and the WA Public School average. The regular rate of attendance for 2022 is lower than previous years, due to the impact of COVID in 2022.

Attendance Rates – Sub Groups

Although Falcon PS does not have an attendance target for Aboriginal students, data indicates that the attendance rate for Aboriginal students is above both Like Schools and WA Public Schools.





Locally Raised Revenue vs Actual







